The previous pool company was unable to maintain a consistent water level or keep up with the falling leaves. Frequently, the pool filter became clogged, the water flow to the heater was insufficient and the heater would shut down. Fix (sort of). Repeat. The cyclical interruption of heated water was problematic. Enter new service, Aqua Serv Pool. Initially the agreement was for five days a week until everything was properly diagnosed and repaired in the pump house. Yay! Things have been running swimmingly.

Compliance Committee

ne of the most common challenges for Community Associations is how to effectively enforce association rules when residents repeatedly violate them. To start, it is important that the rules and regulations, as set forth in a community's governing documents, be enforced consistently for each and every member, director, officer and resident. If a Board of Directors is forced to deal with a repeat violator, who is obliged but has no intent of complying with the community's rules, one of the most effective tools an Association Board can use is



provided in Article 718.303 of the Florida Condo Statutes. The statute allows for the Board to impose monetary fines against the violator and/or suspend voting rights as well as access to community amenities such as the clubhouse area, pool, fitness center and RV lot.

Article III, Paragraph L of our Briar Creek II Condo Documents, details how the compliance and fining process works. When residents move here, everyone agrees in writing that they will abide by the association's rules and restrictions. It is always the association's goal to first encourage residents to comply with association rules and restrictions out of respect for our neighbors and personal community pride. However, at times, it may be necessary to take more firm steps to ad-dress non-compliance. Consequently, your Board of Directors, at its January 2021 Board Meeting, has taken the initiative to establish a resident based "Compliance Committee".

Working under the direction of the Board and in accordance with both Briar Creek official documents and the State of Florida Article 718 statute, this committee will work with owners and residents to help ensure BCII is the friendly, wonderful and beautifully maintained community in which we live. At the same time the committee will also assist with non-compliance issues to review alleged violations as needed.

For 2021, the newly formed "Compliance Committee" will have five members as follows:

Bob Raynor, Chairman Bonnie Briggs, Member Sandy Fassett, Member Dick Howd, Member Sam Oliverio, Member

Because this is a new committee, initial emphasis will be on member training, compliance with BC2 and Article 718 process requirements, becoming familiar with our board's existing compliance efforts, and working with Progressive Management to coordinate communications.

As we move forward with this new initiative, we will keep you informed of our progress. In the meantime, everyone is encouraged to review our BC2 documents to help ensure we are following association rules and abiding by established restrictions. Should you need an updated copy of the BC2 documents, contact Progressive Management.

<u>Visitor Parking</u> is at the clubhouse on the side of the shuffleboard courts, (grassy area). Please put the VISITORS PASS in the front windshield. Residents who do not have the pass can contact a board member. Parking in an empty carport is NOT allowed without permission.

STOP at ALL STOP SIGNS, and, our SPEED LIMIT is <u>15MPH</u>. Your help is greatly appreciated.

"FOR SALE" & "FOR RENT" Signs are restricted to "14" X 12" and may be posted inside a STREET SIDE window only of the mobile home unit. No other signs of any kind shall be displayed."

TREES

If you have trees that overhang any street in the community you must keep them trimmed to 14 feet above the road. This allows for the passage of fire equipment, rescue vehicles, and trash trucks to get in without hitting them. Please look at your trees and if they overhang the street allowing less than 14 foot clearance make arrangements to get them trimmed to the proper height.

LEAVES

Residents are responsible for raking the leaves on their property. You can bag them and put them out on Monday for pickup or you can place them in cans and they will be picked up on Wednesday.

The lawn service does not pick up leaves.

year ago I wrote a small piece about the beginning of "Covid times". A year later, what has changed? Did we ever imagine it would take the world a year to get as far as we have?

On March 2020, I wrote

This morning, after going to the pharmacy to pick up a 90 day supply of the meds that are starting to run low, we went to Publix to buy a few necessities like milk, veggies and fruit, and we have never seen the store so full of people but so empty of products. Several shelves were empty, and the meat cases had only very limited supplies left. Hopefully this picture will change.

I'm sure we are all sorry that it has become necessary to close the clubhouse to group gatherings. A tough decision for the Board to make, but one that makes sense given the apparent easy spread of this virus and the susceptibility of residents, especially those in the older age group. It would be tragic to enjoy a couple of hours of entertainment and a dance etc and risk having the virus spread among us.

But we are fortunate. There is no reason we can't enjoy each other's company, well maybe a meter away from us and with only an elbow bump instead of a warmer greeting. We can sit outside or in a lanai: we can "visit and chat" with each other from the safety of the seats in our golf carts, or just taking a break during a walk. We don't have to worry about it being too cold or snowy to go outside, and we can sit by the pond and watch our neighborhood alligator swimming around. Life will be ok...and good.

So, neighbors, feel free to come and ring our doorbell and have a visit, share a few laughs and bless the day you chose to come and live in Briar Creek.

On March 3rd, 2021, I am writing

Okay, it's a year since we had to "close down" life as we knew it in Briar Creek. How have we done? Did we need to stockpile that much toilet paper? Have we been able to find all the groceries we needed?

It has been a year of ups and downs. We did have a few residents who tested positive and a few who actually had the virus, and are finding the recovery slow. The good news however is



that no-one in the park was lost to the virus.

We have become accustomed to putting on masks before opening the car door to go shopping, sanitizing the groceries before putting them away, talking with friends golf cart to golf cart or from opposite sides of the street. But as time has gone by, we see the golf carts getting closer to each other and small groups of neighbors chatting at the end of the driveway, and we've been able to have small social gatherings at home, and "distanced" meetings at the clubhouse.

We have had the pool open for most of the year (when it hasn't been too cold), and it has not been hard to live with the limit of 10 people in the pool at one time. If someone arrived at the pool when there were already 10 people in the water, what you usually heard was someone in the water saying "I've been here long enough, it's time for me to get out anyway."

The Library has been well used and our three librarians have made sure that all books and puzzles being reshelved were clean and sanitized. People using the exercise room have cleaned the equipment after they used it.

There has been no major shortage of food in the grocery stores, and we see Amazon Prime and Fedex trucks daily (hourly?) looking after our other shopping needs.

On the less positive side, we have sorely missed the opportunity to get to know new residents and invite them over for a glass of wine. We have missed being able to visit with residents in hospital. We have missed seeing family members living elsewhere. We have missed many of our Canadian snowbirds, but appreciated that at least some were able to join us. We have missed the Entertainment events at the park, but we enjoyed the few activities that were organized such as the golf cart parade. Whoever saw a masked golf cart before?

We have done a lot of maintenance work on our homes, sewn a lot of masks in those first months, deep cleaned cupboards and storage areas, done puzzles, watched a lot of TV and DVDs, and discovered shopping on-line for groceries.

Now that so many of us have been able to get the vaccine shots, it is a big relief, although we are not at the end of the tunnel yet. As a vaccinated person you can still carry and pass on the virus, so it we still need to wear masks in public places and maintain distancing. It is not clear when we will be able to resume a "normal" social life with group events in the clubhouse, but there is light at the end of that tunnel.

The bottom line is that though there have been tough times, we've done well and living in a community like Briar Creek has helped us on our journey through the year of Covid.

It Gets Hotter, and Plants Need Water

rom now until the end of May, the dry season is at its peak. April is often the driest month in this part of Florida, with an average of only 3 rainy days. At the same time, the temperature is going up. Lawns and other plants can start to suffer.

Currently, Pinellas County has restrictions that call for lawn watering only twice a week: On Thursday and Sunday for even-numbered addresses, and on Wednesday and Saturday for odd-numbered. Sprinklers should be set and watched so that water doesn't run down the street.

No lawn irrigation is allowed between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. when it's hottest. Hand watering can be done at any time, though, if plants need it.

In contrast, by mid-June the rains will be rumbling through daily. They keep on that way until mid-October. Of course, it's Florida, so rain isn't unheard of at any time—in spite of what my weather app says.

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



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
